IMMEDIATE ACTION REQUIRED RE: CHINOOK RETENTION APRIL-JULY

The final decision on Chinook retention this year (April through end of July) has been delayed. In fact, it was sent to Ottawa and Fisheries Minister Jordan will make a final decision in the very near future. **There is still a very limited time window for action.**

SALISH SEA SPRING FISHING DERBY REPORT

Saturday March 27th was the inaugural Salish Sea Spring Fishing Derby. Considering this was a new event for SVIAC, as well as early in the year on the fishing calendar, by all accounts it was a better-than-expected success.

The weather was good, the wind didn't blow too hard, although it was a chilly breeze and the waves were manageable, especially after the tide change. Our derby contestants fished hard, but there weren't a lot of fish weighed in. There was a total of 110 derby entrants. When the scale closed at 4:00PM, surprisingly only 11 fish had been weighed in (9 Chinook and 2 Halibut).

The prize results were as follows:

Largest Legal Salmon - 13.11 lbs (Hatchery Chinook) Jen Elliot

Largest Legal Halibut - 21.38 lbs Anna Byatt

Swag Draw Prize 1st - Scotty 2106 Downrigger Chris Bos re-donated

Swag Draw Prize 2nd - Mooching Rod & Reel Len Harvey

Swag Draw prize 3rd - Halibut Harpoon Grant Sawyer

The event went well thanks to our gracious host and this year's derby sponsor Cheanuh Marina, whose first-rate staff were so helpful and made sure everything ran smoothly. Even though we were again faced with the challenges of COVID-19, participants and spectators honoured the personal distancing and mask wearing restrictions. With 110 participants the two cash prizes were \$2,200 each. Anna Byatt's 21.38 lb halibut took home one cash prize and, in truth, we were all a little surprised no one weighed in a large halibut. Jen Elliot, with a nice 13.11 lb hatchery Chinook, took home both the biggest

salmon cash prize (\$2,200) and the Skippers Challenge (\$750) for a total cash haul of \$2,950.00 All-in-all a great day was had by everyone.

We are very happy to report the Salish Sea Spring Fishing Derby made \$2,480 net profit



2021 SOOKE CHINOOK ENHANCEMENT INITIATIVE

Well, it's that exciting time of year when the Sooke Chinook Enhancement Initiative sea pen project becomes active again. Yes, we are only days away from our first of two batches of fish being delivered. The pens were just moved back into place at the Sooke Harbour Resort and Marina the other day; many thanks to the lads from Jenkins Marine for helping us. Glen Varney and his trusty crew of volunteers will be getting the system set up and ready to receive the first batch of 325,000 little fish. We are told the Chinook smolts are approximately 3.5 grams each.



Apparently, the fish are doing well and, as per the Nitnat Hatchery, they have been given their compulsory Vibrio Virus treatment. As usual, thousands have been adipose finclipped and fitted with a coded wire tag. The Nitnat Hatchery crew will bring the fish by truck from the hatchery to Sooke (about 3.5-hour drive time). Once in the pen, Glen and his team will make sure the hungry little smolts are well fed and kept safe for several weeks before their release.



This year, 2021, is a watershed moment for our project. It marks the fifth anniversary of SVIAC putting the first batch of fish in the water (2017 – 210,000). Many said it couldn't be done. Many scoffed that we would never get permission from DFO. And yes, at times, we were skeptical too. But it is fantastic to report to you here in the SVIAC news bulletin that WE (that's all of us) have successfully coordinated this very important community-based program from the very start. And proudly we can boast, that after the second batch of healthy Chinook smolts are released this year we will have processed 2,525,000 juvenile salmon. Don't forget, that accomplishment is with NO GOVERNMENT MONEY, not a penny. To date, we've raised over \$300,000 to make the Sooke Chinook



Enhancement Initiative reality. Although it certainly hasn't been easy, we have privately funded this from day one and will continue to do so.

But during COVID-19 our fundraising model has been wrecked. Our whale watching sponsors' businesses are all struggling to survive the international travel restrictions, so we have to look elsewhere. It is very difficult, but SVIAC is making progress little by little. We have managed to clear up all the outstanding costs from 2020, which is a great piece of news. We owe a huge thank you to our dear friends at the Pacific Salmon Foundation for their support too. Now our focus turns to this year 2021 and our 650,000 healthy Chinook smolts. We must find the funds to pay for this before the summer is over.

So, it is with great excitement we deliver this project in anniversary year five, yet with anxiety that funds need to be found to keep this worthy project on track.

We urgently need your help. More than ever before. This is a fight for our salmon fisheries we cannot afford to lose. We must get our hatchery Chinook retention opportunities back and open up Chinook fishing where there are no wild stocks of concern. Equally, we must find funds to continue our Sooke Chinook Enhancement Initiative and keep releasing hundreds of thousands of salmon each year. The stronger we are and the bigger our voice, the more effective we will be. Please support us in any way you can.
